TRAINING

• YAUFR members completed a total of 3,716 training hours for the first quarter of 2019.

- Spring company burns have been completed by all shifts.
- Fall company burns are scheduled for October 23rd, 30th, and November 6th.
- Nine members have completed Fire Officer III to continue their career development.
- Haz-Mat Operations refresher classes were completed by all shifts.
- Annual respiratory training and FIT testing has been completed by all shifts.
- Check your EMT con-ed status. Make sure you are on schedule to have the required hours for recertification. Make sure all material is submitted to the Federation in a timely manner to avoid any issues before your certification expires.
- Don't forget to enter all your daily training in Target Solutions. Check your training tracker to monitor your required ISO training hours for the year.
- Please forward copies of training certificates that you receive so we can keep your training records current.

TMI DRILL

On May 7, 2019, YAUFR's Regional Emergency Management team participated in the bi-annual Three Mile Island nuclear power plant drill.

15 career and EMA volunteer personnel staffed the Emergency Operations Center at Fire Station 891 on Commons Drive, taking actions to assist affected areas of the community as the simulated emergency unfolded. Each staff member followed an established plan to coordinate the actions of police, fire, EMS, public works, and agencies during a simulated nuclear emergency. Tasks included notifying the public, controlling access to areas within a 10-mile radius of



the plant, coordinating the flow of traffic out of evacuation areas, and assisting those residents with special needs.

This was the second TMI exercise in which our regional EMA participated. Staff received positive feedback from the PEMA observer stationed in our EOC. We are always in need of additional volunteers to expand our EMA staff. FIRE SAFETY REMINDERS

Now that summer has arrived, many of us enjoy sitting out and enjoying the weather with friends and family.

Here are a few fire safety reminders:

• If you have a portable outdoor fireplace (commercially available at most home stores), just a reminder that fire code requires that these be placed at least 15 feet from any structure or combustible material.

• Should you choose to have a small campfire (in a vessel other than one available commercially), these must be done at lease 25 feet from any structure or combustible material.

• Any recreational fire should be constantly attended at ALL times, and have a fire-extinguishing agent (fire extinguisher, garden hose, sand, dirt, etc.) available for immediate utilization.

CARBON MONOXIDE AND SMOKE DETECTORS

How familiar are you with the dangers of Carbon Monoxide (CO)?

Did you know that "CO" is a colorless, odorless, and tasteless gas? Without the protection of a simple and inexpensive detector, you and your family may be at risk. These detectors work much like the common smoke detector, except that they check the air for the levels of CO in "parts per million". If you have gas fueled appliances (commonly a dryer, furnace, hot water heater, or a stove), a chimney, or if you run gas engines near your home, it is important to have functional CO detectors in your home. The longer you are exposed, the more severe the issues can be! Common symptoms of CO poisoning are similar to the flu and include headaches, nausea, vomiting, and confusion.

As always, please remember to check the batteries in your smoke detectors as well. We always suggest changing the batteries in your detectors when you change your clocks for daylight savings time in the spring and fall.

Should you find that any of your detectors are over 10 years old, they can be purchased at any hardware store.
