Fire Prevention

Each year, October serves as National Fire Safety Month. Throughout the course of this month, YAUFR Units attended no less than 50 different events throughout our community.

These range from Pre-School fire safety discussions for a group of 4 year olds, to corporate fire drills, to fire extinguisher training for retirement community residents and staff. We work in conjunction with the NFPA (National Fire Protection Association) to focus on a key message related to fire safety as part of these public education sessions. This year, the campaign message is "Don't Wait – Check the Date! Replace

Smoke Alarms Every 10 Years". This is the culmination of a three year effort to help educate the public on the necessity of smoke alarms, and smoke alarm safety. More specifically, we focused on discussing these topics during all of our public interactions:

- Smoke alarms should be replaced every 10 years
- ➤ Make sure you know how old all of the smoke alarms are in your home
- ➤ To find out how old a smoke alarm is, look at the date of manufacture on the back of the alarm. The alarm should be replaced 10 years from that date

As always, please remember to check the batteries in your detectors as well. We always suggest changing the batteries in your detectors when you change your clocks for daylight savings time in the spring and fall.

Should you find that your alarm is out of date, they can be purchased at any hardware store. If you need assistance with installation, obtaining a detector, or if you have any other questions relating to smoke detectors or fire safety – please contact our office at 717-718-2381. Regional Emergency

Pennsylvania Title 35 is the Emergency Management Services Code.

Under Title 35, municipal elected officials are required to provide for the health, safety, and welfare of their community. They must designate an Emergency Management Coordinator, adopt an Emergency Operations Plan, and establish an Emergency Operations Center. Emergency Management officials coordinate the resources needed to manage and mitigate damage from manmade or natural disasters. They provide support to first responders operating at the scene of incidents. After the response is complete, the focus shifts to helping the community to recover and get back to normal.

Earlier this year, Manchester, Springettsbury, and Spring Garden Townships voted to create a regional **Emergency Management Agency** (EMA). The new regional EMA falls under York Area United Fire and Rescue. The fire department command staff (Fire Chief and Battalion Chiefs) serve as the **Emergency Management Coordinator** and Deputy Coordinators. The Emergency Operations Center, located at Station 891 (back up EOC will be at Station 895), is run by the Coordinator or Deputy Coordinator and will be overseen by a staff comprised of officials and volunteers from the three Townships.
