TRAINING

- YAUFR members completed a total of 14,838.24 training hours year to date for 2020.
- In the 4th quarter crews honed their skills in the area of fireground operations (single family residential fires, multiunit residential fires, basement fires, flammable liquids/gas fires, heating emergencies), engine company operations, Fire Behavior (thermal imager applications, reading smoke, flow path control) and Inclement weather operations (inclement weather driving review and cold weather pump operations).
- Bi-annual CPR re-certification was completed in November for 1st Battalion personnel.
- Fall burn refreshers were completed in November, with crews focused on initial company operations with multiple scenarios requiring the use of leader line operations.
- Remember to check your EMT con-ed status. Personnel are reminded to ensure all required con-ed is submitted and the recertification application is completed in a timely manner to avoid any issues before your certification expires.
- Please forward copies of training certificates that you receive so we can keep your training records current.






ANNUAL LADDER TESTING

Ladders are essential to the fire department.

Ladders are essential to any fire department. They are sometimes the only tool we have to gain access to the upper floors to reach a fire or perform a rescue. Portable ladders are specifically designed for fire service use and are built to hold two to three times the weight of a hardware store style ladder. Portable fire service ladders are inspected annually for structural integrity and must pass several tests. Each rung is visually inspected and checked for damage and cracking. Main beams are also inspected for similar issues. The most difficult test a ground ladder must pass is the weight test. This test is completed by fully extending the ladder and placing it horizontally on stands. Weight is slowly added until a total of 750lbs is being held by the ladder. The ladder must not only hold this load but return to its original straightness after the load is removed. While this is generally done annually, we also perform these types of tests after any significant exposure to heat or physical damage. Along with annual inspections, our ground ladders are routinely cleaned, inspected, and lubricated to maintain their performance.



Interesting fact: The best lubricant for an aluminum fire service ladder is carnauba car wax; it helps clean and lubricate aluminum while not leaving a sticky film that would attract dirt and debris.

WINTER PREPAREDNESS

It's hard to believe that another year has passed, and winter is here again!


Since we have experienced our first winter storm of the season, we would like to remind you of some important information to prepare for possible winter storms. At home, make sure that after a snowstorm, you clear a path to your house from the road. This will help people, including emergency responders, reach you safely. If you have a fire hydrant on or near your property, make sure snow is cleared at least 36" all the way around it. Businesses should also make sure that fire hydrants and sprinkler system connections are kept clear of snow and ice. This information is particularly important to keep in mind when plowing snow from parking lots and driveways.



Also make sure you are prepared with any supplies that might be needed in case you can't leave the house. Supplies should be enough to last up to 3 days. If you operate a generator during power outages, make sure to keep the exhaust away from any windows, doors, or vents, to avoid carbon monoxide from entering the building. Never operate a generator inside a building, and never try to refuel a generator while it is running!

WINTER SAFETY TIPS

Now that winter is upon us, we wanted to share some safety tips to help keep your and your family safe this winter!

• If you have a fireplace, please make sure that you have the flu and chimney cleaned regularly. When you burn wood in your fireplace, a natural byproduct of this process is "creosote". When your chimney is cold, this product of combustion will stick to the inside of your flu and build up over time. Creosote is highly flammable and can cause a fire that burns at a high temperature, potentially cracking the chimney liner and endangering your home!

• Many of our homes have appliances that are powered by natural gas. This may include a hot water heater, oven, or even your furnace. When these appliances do not burn their fuel cleanly, carbon monoxide is created. Unfortunately, "CO" is colorless, odorless and tasteless. This



means that if there were a problem in your home your may not know it until it was too late. A simple meter can be purchased that measures the amount of CO in your home and will alert you if levels reach a point where you should evacuate. If you need assistance with where to find a detector, and how/where to install it in your home please contact us at 717-718-2383.

• Use caution when running small gasoline engines near your home. The small engines (snow blowers, generators, etc.) also produce carbon monoxide which can be propelled into your home through exhaust. This same can be said of warming up your car in the garage! Always run gasoline engines in an area away from your home.

• This winter has already given us our first significant snow in quite some time. Always remember that when you are out shoveling to take frequent breaks, lift with your knees (not your back!), and stay hydrated.

• Many of us love the sight of holiday lights and fresh fallen snow. However, please use caution on the roads during inclement weather. Leave extra space between you and other vehicles, plan ahead for braking, reduce your speed, and if at all possible, just stay home. We love our residents, but we don't want to see any of you in an unscheduled fashion!




