FIRE CHIEFS COMMENTS

Once again in the blink of an eye, we are looking at the end of another year. It has been, and continues to be, a challenging time for our fire department. This year we were challenged with significant, long-term leave for not one or two, but at one point five personnel. Not only was this a huge unplanned budgetary impact, but it also challenged us in filling shifts. I know most firefighters usually appreciate some overtime, but this past year proved that too much of anything can be burdensome. I want to express my appreciation to our entire department for stepping up and making sure apparatus and stations were properly staffed so we could fulfill our mission to our communities.

We started the year acknowledging the retirement of Battalion Chief John Woods, who was instrumental in developing this department from the beginning. We followed several months later by saying goodbye to Captain Rich Higgins on his well-deserved retirement after more than 27 years. Shortly thereafter, FF Nathan Tracey announced his early retirement from the department. We continue to wish BC Woods, Captain Higgins and FF Tracey well with this next stage of their lives.

That wasn't the end of it though. In August we were notified that a huge part of our daily operations would be taking a Fire Chief position in North Carolina, and so at the end of September we said goodbye and congratulations to Battalion Chief Matt Arnold. The impact Chief Arnold had on this departments daily operations cannot be overstated, and his absence is felt on numerous levels. And lastly we are ending the year preparing to say goodbye and congratulations to BC Brett Graham as he heads north to Dauphin County to assume the Deputy Chief position with Lower Paxton Township. BC Graham has made significant contributions to a more defined training plan for the department and his attention to training and certification will be missed.

No individual is bigger than the department they serve. And, despite this department losing a lot of experience in 2022, we are fortunate to have established a culture with great people ready to move into these roles and our newly hired replacements promise a bright future that gives us confidence in maintaining our forward momentum.

The last two years have been challenging in other ways as well. We continue to express the need for additional staffing to keep our residents and personnel safe during operations. During 2022, the YAUFR Commission hired a consultant to evaluate that need. Although this study paints the same picture that our command staff has provided, there is no mandate to do anything with the results of the study. We must continue to tell our story and ensure that we are heard.

Also, during budget preparation for 2023, another priority was to address some inequity regarding our command and administrative staff to assist in motivating personnel to strive for continued advancement. We will continue to carry that message forward as well. We firmly believe that our residents and our personnel are best served by our own people, who know the culture, the administrative and operational processes, and the community. YAUFR personnel have already made a commitment to care for your family as though they were their own.

Our last initiative for 2023 revealed during our annual budget presentation was the need to be forward thinking as it relates to apparatus replacement. YAUFR personnel have been working hard to review and establish specifications for a future apparatus replacement that is due in 2025. However, in the last two years apparatus manufacturing has increased from less than one year to deliver, to presently being 24-30 months after ordering for delivery. In order to receive apparatus according to our scheduled replacement plan, we are asking for our charter townships to support our next apparatus purchase with an ordinance to authorize the expenditure. If we are successful in accomplishing this in 2023, we will remain hopeful that our next apparatus order will be delivered prior to the end of 2025, barring any supply chain issues.

Like I said, it has been a busy year for the department. YAUFR held two promotional processes from which we have already promoted Lieutenant Celeste Jones as our first Lieutenant, and we will have two new Battalion Chief's and four more new Lieutenants officially promoted in January of 2023. Preparations are underway for a new records management system implementation to begin the new year as well.

We established an apparatus technician program in Manchester Township, and have made significant movement in the adoption of the 2018 edition of the International Fire Code. Manchester Township and Spring Garden Township are already on board, and we remain hopeful that Springettsbury Township will follow suit in order to provide us the ability for consistent education and enforcement across all of our communities.

As I was searching for a photo that has not been used in previous editions of the Fire Chief's Corner, I came across the one of me reading to some students at Yorkshire Elementary. I feel as though this picture is very appropriate, as it signified our service commitment - to the community and in this case the future of our community and to our employees and their family members. It is a responsibility that our entire staff approaches with the utmost sincerity and with a passion that goes beyond the uniform we wear.

As we rapidly approach Christmas, please remember all those serving and caring for you and your family and support them in any manner possible. Keeping communities safe and futures bright takes the whole village, and we will be continuing to do our part with training, equipment and personnel that are second to none and an honest and transparent approach in order to maintain your trust. We salute all of our career and volunteer personnel who contribute to our mission and vision.

From YAUFR to all who we serve, thank you for your support. We wish you a very merry Christmas and as always, remember to take care of one another!

TRAINING

YAUFR members completed a total of 11,816 training hours to date in 2022.





TRAINING

- In place of our Fall Company Level burns, all personnel participated in Flashover recognition training provided by the Pennsylvania State Fire Academy. This valuable training provided our staff hands on practical training in fire behavior and demonstrations that prepare them to recognize hazardous conditions within the fire building.
- Bi-Annual CPR and AED training was completed by 1st Battalion Staff.
- During the month of November, department personnel completed the 1006 Rope Rescue Technician course through Buck County Community College. Personnel were required to show proficiency in high level technical rescue competencies and were later tested to obtain national certification. We are proud to announce that YAUFR now has 33 new Rope Rescue Technicians on roster.
- Remember to check your EMT con-ed status. Personnel are reminded to ensure all required con-ed is submitted and the recertification application is completed in a timely manner to avoid any issues before your certification expires.
- Please forward copies of training certificates that you receive so we can keep your training records current.



UPCOMING PROMOTIONS

During 2022, YAUFR was successful in establishing the rank of Lieutenant within our department. This rank has not existed in YAUFR since our first contract was signed. With support from the YAUFR Commission and through cooperative efforts from both of our locals, we were able to recreate the position to fit into our current officer structure. Staff felt that this effort was critical to the appropriate development of our personnel and/or future officers, providing a logical process for advancement that did not exist previously.

On May 14, 2022, Celeste Jones was officially promoted to the rank of Lieutenant. Lt. Jones is the first YAUFR firefighter promoted to the rank of Lieutenant. Lt. Jones is a seventeen-year veteran of the department.

In January four more firefighters will be promoted to the rank of Lieutenant. FF Aaron Eckert is a fifteen-year veteran of the department, FF David Kane is a seventeen-year veteran and FF Todd Kroh is a fourteen-year veteran of our department. FF Chris Mowry, a fourteen year veteran of the department will be promoted to Lieutenant on January 14th.

Captain William Blackwell is a nineteen-year veteran of our department. Captain Blackwell was promoted to his current rank in 2017 and will be assuming the rank of Battalion Chief on January 1, 2023.

Captain Todd Heilman will retire on January 13th, 2023 to complete 30 years as a Manchester Township Firefighter. Captain Heilman will begin his new career as a YAUFR Battalion Chief on January 16th.



SNOW SHOVELING

Unfortunately, winter means freezing rain, ice, and snow. Snow shoveling leads to many injuries and heart attacks. Here are some tips to keep you safe.

- Do not shovel after eating or while smoking
- Lake it slow and stretch out before you begin
- Shovel only fresh, powdery snow; it's lighter
 - Push the snow rather than lifting it.
 - Lift with your legs, not your back
 - Do not work to the point of exhaustion
 - Know the signs of a heart attack, and stop immediately and call 911

Rising Cost of Heating Fuels.



Here are some tips when trying to stay warm during the colder months.

- Use a mesh ember screen with your wood burning fireplace.
- Dispose of burnt fuels in a metal container with a lid and place it away from combustibles.
- Do not use outdoor propane heaters inside.
- Space heaters need to be monitored and never plugged into extension cords.
- Low-income individuals can apply for heating assistance through LIHEAP.

STATION 893 STORAGE ROOM PROJECT


YAUFR would like to give a special shout out to the members of C Shift for picking up a project for Captain Krout who is off on an injury.


